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Director's Message

The focus of the 2022–25 planning period was to rebuild and restore adult education programs and services across the region. As we continue to face pandemic-related challenges, the consortium has adopted flexible instructional options to help students persist and meet their educational and career goals. Demand for online instruction has not waned with the easing of restrictions and the return to in-person learning. Across the CAERC region, adult education agencies support and offer classes in person, online, or in a hybrid hyflex format. With students and teachers becoming familiar and comfortable with digital tools for learning and instruction, remote and blended classrooms have become a permanent learning environment in the adult education landscape.

In 2021–22, CAERC members articulated goals to address basic skills instruction, career education needs, and expanding support services and outreach. Regional adult education enrollments were stagnant at the start of the program year. However, by the spring of 2022, an increased interest in adult education programs resulted in a 30% jump in enrollees compared to the previous year. Furthermore, in a surprise reversal of the downward trend of adult English Language Learner (ELL) enrollments in 2020-21, ELL student enrollment increased by 36% as of May 2022. In addition, the number of adults served in ABE/ASE and CTE continues to surpass the previous year's numbers.

The demand for literacy-level ESL classes has significantly increased with the influx of Afghan refugees to Sacramento regions like Arden, Elk Grove, and Rancho Cordova, which prompted schools in those areas to support ESL classes and align curricula for students at this level. In June, CAERC members and partners collaborated with the California Department of Education and participated in the FEMA-sponsored Welcome Center for Afghan Evacuees. The event provided resources to a wide range of supportive and social services, including adult education and career development opportunities.

Career and Workforce Preparation programs supported by CAERC members this year have grown to include over a dozen industry sectors. Career pathway offerings include Careers with Children/ Instructional Assistant (see page 4), Culinary Arts, Medical Office Careers, Nursing Assistant, Vocational Nursing, and Pharmacy Technician. Recently implemented pathways include Business and Finance, Future Fire Academy (see page 5), and School Bus Training (see page 4).

FROM THE THREE-YEAR PLAN

2022–25 CAEP Objectives and CAERC Regional Strategies

After several months of collaboration, data analysis, and self-assessment, CAERC members officially approved the consortium's three-year plan for 2022–25 on May 4, 2022. The plan includes three CAEP-identified state objectives: (1) addressing educational needs, (2) improving the integration of services and transitions, and (3) improving the effectiveness of services.

- **To address educational needs**, CAERC and its members will continue to sustain, expand, refine, and offer high-quality courses and services that provide the region's adult learners with the academic and vocational programs to meet their personal, educational, and career goals.
- **To improve the integration of services and transitions**, CAERC and its members will develop and support alignment efforts and career pathways in addition to increasing student support services.
- To improve the effectiveness of services, CAERC and its members will participate in professional development to support the consortium's regional priorities and strategies, enhance data and accountability systems, and leverage resources.

Adult Education and Workforce Prep

Located at the Independence High School Campus and under the guidance of Principal Kelly Hunkins, Amador Adult Education has been offering future life and job opportunities to all adults, of all ages and backgrounds, through developing skill and career sets. "Adult education programs are so important and needed; it's never too late to further your education or learn a new skill set for your future career, and we want people to know that we offer several courses for free, right in Sutter Creek," Principal Kelly Hunkins explained.

The school's mission is to create new paths for families through providing education, career, and skill training; and the results have been an influx of driven clients/students who are supported by a group of dedicated staff who operate together with their four core values of respect, honesty, kindness, and responsibility. "Classes run on the same calendar as the Amador County Unified School District, but we start and end two weeks after the school year calendar does," [Ms. Hunkins] added. "We partner with you to meet individual unique needs and help you achieve your goals. Amador Adult Ed offers a range of education and career preparation courses, like the School Bus Driver program, which includes paid training, in addition to paraeducator and computer/ digital skill courses."

Funding for these various workforce readiness programs is made possible through the ACUSD-Amador Adult Education partnership, along with

the ACUSD being in the Capital Adult Educational Regional Consortium, or CAERC. "The exciting part of this is we are interconnected with 14 other schools that offer adult ed in the Sacramento area, so any of the programming that they offer, like Sac City has Manufacturing, we can send our students to that," Ms. Hunkins smiled. "If there's another career path you're interested in that is not offered in Sutter Creek, Amador Adult Education can refer you to one of the many other Sacramento-area adult education schools that are also a part of the CAERC Sacramento Region Adult Ed Career and Workforce Readiness Program. You can take courses in so many fields, like culinary arts, vocational nursing, manufacturing/welding, phlebotomy, construction, or business and finance. Many of these courses are free or low-cost, and all are found at schools in the Sacramento Region. There are so many options, and classes are available for both in-person training and online courses."

The Future Fire Academy is passionate about helping community members and formerly incarcerated individuals start/continue their firefighting careers! While FFA was originally founded with the formerly incarcerated in mind, they are open to all individuals. Our first academy was a mix of backgrounds, some with and without convictions.

El Dorado County Office of Education (EDCOE) partnered with FFA to provide a campus for inclass instruction, and behind-the-scenes support. The Future Fire Academy has secured partners in municipal fire departments and private fire companies that have committed to hiring options with our graduates. All graduates from the first class who applied for positions in the fire service have received offers of employment! The cadets become part of the fire family, and it is important that they succeed. As part of the training, they are also provided support and assistance with resumes, applications, and interviews.

Folsom Cordova Adult Education Paraeducator Training

Please join us in congratulating our latest ESL completer—Ana Silvia Pimentel! Silvia has promoted from advanced ESL and joined the workforce in the Folsom Cordova School District.

When Silvia joined us from Michoacán, México, six years ago, it was to be with her husband and children. Silvia's husband had found a great job in Folsom and the family of course wanted to follow him there. But when Silvia arrived in California, full of people rapidly speaking a language she wasn't fully familiar with, she found that her shy nature held her back.

Fortunately, someone told her about the ESL program at Folsom Cordova Adult School in Rancho Cordova. Though it was mid-2020, the school had begun offering distance learning courses. Silvia registered for intermediate-high ESL and began attending regularly. Gradually, she began speaking more and more, at first in breakout rooms and then at whole-class level. Through contact with her classmates and teacher, Silvia began building confidence in speaking English in front of others and enrolled in FCAS' online paraeducator training course in the hopes of working with children in schools.

Building up her language skills, improving her CASAS scores, and empowered to start her

employment search, Silvia went from an anonymous black box on the Zoom screen to a camera-on mainstay of classroom conversations. She said that "[]] feel safe here," referring to her distance learning classroom. But she didn't stop there. Silvia soon found employment with our district as a yard supervisor, then paraeducator, finally adding a service position as secretary of the District English Learner Advisory Committee. In this





capacity Silvia speaks in Spanish and English in front of crowds of people—something she never would have done two years ago!

We at FCAS could not be more proud of Silvia and want to extend an invitation to anyone who wants or needs to improve their English skills to contact their local adult school today and ask about registering for ESL courses.
